Measuring birth trauma related PTSD in maternity staff - an adapted City Birth Trauma Scale for Midwives & Obstetricians

Maternity services are more challenging for staff than ever before, and there is a growing awareness of the psychological impact on midwives & obstetricians of repeated exposure to traumatic events in the workplace. The City BiTS (Professionals version) aims to allow staff struggling with workplace PTSD to be identified, and to seek help, as well as allowing us a better understanding of what causes PTSD in staff to better enable us to plan services and support to reduce long-term psychological harm to our workforce.

Dangers of misinformation
